

A TRULY PROPER "SEND OFF"

The funeral of race walking legend **George Nibre** saw a large turnout at St Mary's Church on a hot day in Frinton-on-Sea. Race walking was well represented with, among our numbers, 4 Olympians: 1976

Olly Flynn, both 1980 walkers Roger Mills and Ian Richards and 2012/2016 double-Olympian Dominic King plus other Internationals, National Champions, National record holders, Club walkers and their families and our Race Walking Association President Chris Hobbs plus Southern Area activists including Chris Flint. Many travelled long distances to this Essex outpost. George's daughter Anya qualifies as a former walker as she, and her friend Gemma (also present) won medals in the 2016 Southend Mile. At this service was Frinton resident Brian Armstrong, now sole living member of Ilford's 1978 National 10 Miles winning scoring 4 - as George, along with Steve Gower and Geoff Hunwicks, has now sadly left us. A family tribute was spoken by daughter Anya, followed by 3 speeches recalling George's past times in the North East, his race walking contribution and role in the Metropolitan Police. Many former Police colleagues were at the service, including ones who'd held high rank and one who'd joined the same day as George at Hendon. Many chose to proudly wear Police ties in recognition of George. Following exit music "Every Breath You Take" by The Police, a cremation for family and close friends was held in nearby Weeley Crematorium. After the funeral service a gathering commenced at Frintonon-Sea Tennis Club, a short walk away, which those who'd been to the Crematorium joined on their return. The walking world are thanked for giving such a much-missed athlete, coach and mentor a truly memorable send-off.

All sports benefit from having such Trojans as Tony, who completed 20 consecutive Stock Exchange London-to-Brighton Walks from 1973-to-1992 with

a fastest time of 9:41.24 in 1976 when coming 6th (1 position behind Ilford AC colleague Alan Barber C535). Tony's "know how" was used to good effect when also serving as a Great Britain Race Walking team manager. There wasn't an award for 600 appearances, but modest Tony gets his satisfaction from just being there to help out early each Saturday morning.

SAD LOSS OF AN ILFORD AC FORMER PRESIDENT

Popular Tony Nixon (1947-2024), who was a most popular Ilford President in 2003/4. When President he invited Colchester Harrier Dave Wright as an Ilford AC Annual Dinner & Dance guest speaker, who had all attendees in stitches - what a great choice! Noted for his always cheerfulness, he joined llford AC in 1962 and was part of a Club Youth team which won our 1965 Essex Youth's Cross Country Championship. Tony raced "sparingly" on roads - but relished Cross County racing where he was frequently among awards and prizes winners. He moved to Stratford St Mary, his front door being just 100 yards over the Essex/Suffolk border. He loved running along the banks of the River Stour, which was a location of The Centurions' 2022 "Social Walk" organised by Steve Kemp and led by Kim Howard. Tony instigated and organised the "Constable County 5 Miles" run which commenced with a wicked hill! Just like a now defunct Highgate Harriers Open 7 Miles' Walk one supposes? He was our Essex County 1,500 Metres Senior Champion when finishing in 3:53.0. In 2008 son Robert won the Essex 1,500 Metres Championship at Gloucester Park in 3:58.11 and, at that time, they were the first father and son to win a trophy which then had 91 names on it. Tony's win at a 1966 Junior Inter-Counties 2,000 Metres Steeplechase in 5:54.2 still stands as an Ilford AC record. He was a lifelong "Hammers" supporter. A private funeral was held on Friday 12 July followed by a Memorial Service at St Mary's Church in Stratford St Mary which was open to all. We express condolence to his

widow Pat, to whom he'd been married for 51 years and who he'd met at Ilford AC, sons Paul and Robert, his surviving brothers and all other family members. <u>Tony Nixon RIP</u>.

FAREWELL TO NERINGA MASILIONIENE (nee Aidietyte)

On Monday 15 July, Ilford AC Life Member Neringa left her Collier Row (Romford) home to set sail from Dover for a long drive back to her native Lithuania. Coming to Britain in 2009, Neringa joined Ilford AC in 2011. While at Ilford she won our RWA 20K Championship at nearby Hainault Cycle Circuit as well as other Championships and Open races, such as 2 Enfield Open 7 Miles' victories. When living in Bethnal Green she race walked to-and-from our races at Victoria Park. While with Ilford she was selected for 2 Olympics, 2 Europeans and 2 IAAF World Championships. In recent times running races were won with a long sequence of 1st lady awards in numerically well supported class fields. While on our scene she suffered 2 long injury spells. When selected for the 2012 London Olympics, Neringa became Ilford's 5th Olympian after Phyllis Perkins RIP (1960/800m), Fergus Murray (1964/10,000m) Wilbert Greaves and Roger Mills (1980/110m hurdles and 20K Walk respectively). At Rio de Janeiro in 2016 Neringa became the Club's only double-Olympian. In the 2023 TCS London Marathon Neringa ran 2:53.10 to place 3rd on Ilford AC's all-time Women's Marathon rankings list. In a Southern Veterans Track & Field League meeting at Lee Valley Neringa did "the hat trick" with convincing victories in a mixed 2,000m Walk, 400 metres and 1,500 metres runs. Essex County AA gold medals came her way as did an Ilford AC top veteran Athlete-of-the-Year award. Her employment for 10-and-half years was at Nike Superstores in Oxford Street, Camden Town and finally at Kings Cross where her last shift was worked on the Saturday before leaving the UK. Neringa was a popular Club member who supported a number of Ilford's social functions, including a 2023 Centenary Celebration at Fairlop Waters Leisure Complex where she spoke from the stage.

Wednesday 10 July saw Neringa's final appearance, again winning a running race, this time in Ilford AC's Newman Hilly 5 Miles on a testing 2 circuits around Hainault Forest. As so often her first lady award was won by a proverbial mile in another numerically large field of class. We wish Neringa and her husband, son Jokubas and daughter Maya (both born at Harlow's Princess Alexandra Hospital) and French bulldog Indrut, the very best back in Lithuania. We thank Neringa for her outstanding contribution and for many positive memories.



At Hainault Forest Neringa was presented with a plaque to honour her time at Ilford AC. Neringa was in tears at the reception she received on the night. Let Ilford AC's General Secretary and your Essex County Athletic Association Chairman, Andy Catton, who made the presentation, have the last word:

"Neringa was shocked and overwhelmed by the plaque we presented to her along with the card signed by lots of Club members. Great that she was injury-free and able to sign off with a win. Very sad to see her go."

ILFORD AC 50th ANNIVERSARIES COMING UP

In chronological order, **3 August** marks a **50th** anniversary of 3 llford AC race walkers joining The Centurions when the Club finished a full team of 3 for a first time in its history. This occurred at the 1974 Leicester-to-Skegness point-to-point classic when - in fishing order - Upminster-based Dave Neagle came 4th in excellent an 19.15.11 to become member number 527. This despite going off-course twice. once not far from the finishing line. Now Leigh-on-Sea based Alan Barber claimed No 535 with his sub-22 hours finish when passing the finish line in 19th spot at Skegness Foreshore Centre on a popular and bracing sea front esplanade, in 21:59.59. Alan could have arrived earlier, but a level crossing was down on the Boston-to-Skegness line (known locally as "The Poacher" Line) at Wainfleet All Saints 5 miles from the end - forcing a wait for a train, then longer for a 2nd train to pass. He kept in condition by walking around in circles by its closed gate; as a long stop at that stage could have seriously affected his progress and ability to resume action. Closing in Ilford's team in 27th position clocking 22:44.41, was Dave Ainsworth - it was a 2nd attempt having fallen short at the 1973 Bristol 100 Miles. Messrs Neagle and Barber had the kudos of succeeding first time! 64 started/40 finished/1 DQ. In a close team race Ilford were 5th: 1. Leicester 'A' 13 pts, 2. LAT Amsterdam 29 pts, 3. Sheffield 29 pts, 4. RWV Rotterdam 30 pts, 5 Ilford AC 33 pts. Leicester 'B' didn't close in. Times change as 64 on a 100 miles' start line with 6 teams. A much-deserved word for hardworking attendant extraordinaire Tony Perkins, who was to join The Centurions 5 years' later at Ewhurst as C685. A 2014 luncheon to celebrate 40 years, at "The Harrow" in Hornchurch was supported by 33 attenders. A trio with 50 years' membership of The Centurions - and they'll meet up for another celebration lunch at "The Harrow" on Friday 2 August.

3 September marks **50** years since Roger Mills was in the bronze medal position at a European Championship 20 Kilometres' race in Rome. This has been subject of a separate article in Essex Walker, looking back on that great day, and this edition also contains an action photograph. Roger a still active sportsman - he missed July's Moulton 5 Miles (he'd often come to give support) as he was kayaking in the Farne Islands, still turns the pedals in competition and can also be seen on the piste. We highlight 2 dates when reflecting on race walking's better days is a rewarding thing to be doing.

NOEL BLATCHFORD FEATURES IN FILM

<u>Ageless athletes – new documentary shows power of track and field in later life - AW (athleticsweekly.com)</u>

Out on Friday 5 July in a selected cinema release, a new 55-minute film **Younger: Looking Forward To Getting Older** focuses on four female veteran athletes, one being the late Noel Blatchford.

LONG DISTANCE ATHLETICS HAS IMPROVED

A Paris heatwave will worry long distance athletes. It's announced only 2 of 6 Olympic Village eating establishments will have air conditioning and no Village bedrooms will have it either - this to reduce CO2 impact. Looking back at the 1904 Olympic Marathon in St Louis, set at 24 miles 1,500 yards (40k) as a marathon distance hadn't been standardised then, it was held in 32 degrees heat with only 2 water stations. First over the line was Fred Lorz (US) who received an award from President Roosevelt's daughter - which was quickly taken back when revealed he's travelled 10 miles in a car (Fred was banned for life - but soon reduced to 6 months). Gold medallist Tom Hicks (SA) clocked 3:28.53 and was propelled along with strychnine, raw eggs and brandy - wouldn't be allowed nowadays! He'd wanted to stop for a lie down but not allowed by his handlers. 32 started/14 finished. Fourth placed Cuban Andarin Carvajal had a long lie down when taken ill after eating a couple of rotten apples scrumped from a course-side orchard. After a stadium start the course was mainly on dusty roads, which caused some to quit - the route went down busy streets with traffic and pedestrians crossing it, some with dogs, and across railway tracks. I watched Channel 5's most informative 90 minutes' long programme looking at London's 1948 Olympics, which briefly showed Leicester's Tebbs Lloyd Johnson (aged 48 years 115 days) finishing in 4:48.31. In 1948, RAF Halton servicemen, who included George Towers RIP (who organised our 1981 RWA 50k at Sleaford when 102 started) manned 50k feeding tables. In 1936 Tebbs finished 17th (4:54.56) when Harold Whitlock won gold at Berlin (Lancashire's Joe Hopkins was our other competitor). A programme worth watching on My5 "catch up" service (available until 2029).
