#### **OUT WEST**

On the last day of August the Southern Veterans Track and Field held their Grand Final at Oxfordshire's Horspath track. A 2000 metres walk was well supported, and filling the frame were 3 well-known respected names. Winning in 11.16 was **Stephen Crane** who race walked for Ilford AC - a Club on whose books he is a successful and enthusiastic participant in running events. Second in 11.35 was Oxfordshire athletics protagonist **Graham Chapman** who was favourably mentioned in a recent constructive National newspaper article on our discipline. Completing the frame in 12.08 was **Steve** Uttley who, in his second race back after serious illness, is confidently easing himself back onto our scene. Ilford's 3rd walker, 3rd in the M60 category, was Club Chairman Ernie Forsyth in around 15 minutes. Ernie was a race walker for Essex Beagles in long ago years before they merged with Newham AC. He joined Ilford AC as a runner - and still is. His last race walk was on 30 July 1991 at Ilford's South Park when turning out for an Essex League 10k around the park's perimeter roads. It was held in a torrential downpour with thunder and lightning when The Mayor of Redbridge turned out to be our "Mr Starter" performing his civic duty under an umbrella held by a Council Official. The Referee thought about abandoning the race owing to lightning - it was that same evening as Pavarotti's Hyde Park open air concert which gave his followers a similar soaking. Ernie and Stephen both chipped in to assist llford, who are currently somewhat short of race walkers. "That's not all folks" - the pair also spent hours officiating on both pole vault and javelin events. Afterwards Ernie wrote, "I forgot how tough race walking can be. Big field of walkers and I was probably the oldest at 69 years 1 month, but was fairly happy after analysing my first performance since Pavarotti sung in the park".

### IN DOWNTOWN TOOTING

Also on the last day of August was held the Veterans AC & London Masters Open Track 3,000 metres 'A' race on Tooting Bec track. Pride of place from Essex came Brentwood Beagle **Stuart Bennett** in 3rd, who won an M65 age category gold medal with 18:02.57 on the stopwatch.

## NO WAY

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For decades athletics heading for Copthall Stadium (as still known by most, despite its changing of names) have walked along an abandoned railway line from Mill Hill East-to-Edgware, which passes near the back of stadium. Tracks were lifted in 1964. Many were introduced to this short cut by Enfield legend Ron Powell, a then Mill Hill resident now based in Norfolk. Persons trying this disused track on 1st September for a joint LICC/Enfield League track race at what's now known as StoneX Stadium (previously Allianz Stadium) found it's been blocked - so causing them to turn back and walk another longer way. Not to worry about the time taken, as our walking race start was put back by half-an-hour from 11am to 11.30am. But worth noting for future reference.

As for the Stadium, it's unrecognisable from those days when we changed under a run-down old stand. Nowadays it's a Premiership Ground used by the famous Harlequins Rugby Union Club. Two magnificent tall grandstands dominate this site, which is also home to Shaftesbury Barnet Harriers. We had the luxury of changing in facilities used by premiership rugby players - magnificent. We've enjoyed quality dressing rooms when racing at Newmarket's famous "Rowley Mile" racecourse, when using the jockeys' facilities. Copthall has everything, including a spacious free on-site car park. If you've not appeared there for a while, it's well worth a return - you'll be truly impressed.

No mention of Shaftesbury Barnet Harriers could pass with a word for one of their most famous members David Bedford, who was a guest speaker at our Race Walking Association's 2012 Olympic Tribute Luncheon at the Tower Hotel, next to the famous Thames bridge. This function was so popular, numbers filled a large function room with a waiting list of hopefuls still seeking tickets. David, now aged 74, was at our meeting on 1 September - just helping out on tasks with Club members. Isn't it great to see such a worthy "putting something back" into athletics.

# **UK 20km Race Walking Championships**

Incorporating the England, RWA and IOM championships.











Held on the famous "Bowl" circuit in Douglas, Isle of Man, on 8 September it attracted a low turnout despite favourable prepublicity. Racing did provide highlights as the 1-2 in a Men's 20K was close when Callum Wilkinson and Cameron Corbishley sped over the finish line in 1:23.55 and 1:24.28 respectively. 3rd was Guy Thomas in 1:33.37. Abigail Jennings headed the Women's field in 1:45.29. First in the W55 category, Grazia Manzotti, clocked 1:59.20 which is being checked to see if it's a British W55 record.

There was just a handful of 2024 competitors on the Isle of Man for a National 20k - compared to when our June 1975 RWA National 20 Miles Championship was held there (Castletown) when 166 started/140 finished which included 21 teams (4-to-score) with most being mainlanders. The Islanders made the visitors so welcome. Bob Dobson won in 2:36.26 with Sheffield star duo Roy Thorpe and Jake Warhurst completing the frame in 2:37.06 and 2:38.21 respectively with the late Alec Banyard 4th in 2:39.31. Top 3 teams were, in order, Sheffield United Harriers/Southend-on-Sea AC/Brighton & Hove AC. A classy presentation was held in nearby Castle Rushden. At a presentation hard working Bob sat at a table endlessly signing special edition Commemorative 1st Day Covers to record the occasion. We thank the Isle of Man officials and helpers for staging our National 20K Championships.

#### HERE WE GO AGAIN

It's been announced on National TV News that, with Australia's Victorian State dramatically pulling out of hosting the 2026 Commonwealth Games, Glasgow has stepped in to stage the gig. They've offered to organised a "scaled down" event with fewer events. Any offer is better than forfeiting an entire Games, and their gesture should be applauded. However, a scaled down Games could mean a threat to race walking. Glasgow stated the 2014 Commonwealth Games and ditched our discipline completely - this despite considerable campaigning to seek a change of heart, much being orchestrated by 1970 Edinburgh Commonwealth Games 20 Miles bronze medallist Bill Sutherland BEM. The decision firmly stood. We also suffered a Birmingham's 2022 Commonwealth Games setback when traditional road walking was shown the proverbial door - replaced by a couple of 10,000 metres track walks at Alexander Stadium. A "scaled down" Games with reduced events, would again see walking in the firing line for exclusion - so get ready to pick up pens if the call comes.

Steve Uttley writes: It's looking increasingly likely the next Commonwealth Games will be in Glasgow. That probably means no walk again. It might be possible to persuade the organisers to include a 10km track walk again since that requires little extra organisation or infrastructure. However, if the 'ultras' spend all campaigning energy insisting that anything less than a full 20kms and 50kms for both men and women is a betrayal of race walking then that prospect will evaporate. It will be interesting to see what happens.

• Ron Wallwork writes: I lean towards Steve's view that any energy be directed to another track race, reasoning that there might be an outside chance of at least having a walk in the programme.

#### CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE FOR ESSEX-BASED WALKER

Congratulations to Upminster-based Belgrave Harrier *Colin Harle*, who for a 2nd time in his race walking career, has become British Police 10 Kilometres' Champion. The annual race, held for a first time at Evesham Velo Park, saw Colin in overall 3rd place (65.10) - the 2 ahead of him were both Civil

Servants - in what a joint British Police/Civil Service event. First across the finish line was in-form Jonathan Hobbs in 54.39, who is again Civil Service Champion. Others with Essex connections were Ilford's Steve Uttley 6th in 70.43 and Loughton 2nd claimer John Hall, 10th in 74.00. The Ryan Cup, between the 2 organisations saw a Civil Service victory over the British Police. HM Revenue & Customs won the Civil Service team race and Lancashire Police were top Police team. A number of competitors spoke well of the course, one being Centurions' Honorary Secretary Chris Flint who thought it might make a future 100 miles' venue. After decades at Queen Elizabeth II Stadium in Donkey Lane there's been a major alteration. The men's changing room is now the ladies' changing room - and vice versa - they're directly opposite each other on the ground floor. Two race walkers who shall remain nameless - er - walked into the wrong room by force of habit. However, no harm was done, as when mistakenly entering, nobody was disrobed.

We won't publish a full result sheet, as it'd *steal the thunder* of "Enfield Walker" and "Race Walking Record". None passed 10,000 metres, but in brief, 21 raced at the meeting. On Saturday 21st September, 1st in the Enfield League Hour 'A' Section was Chik Ha Kwok with 9,593 metres achieved, top of the 'B' Section was Olympian Ian Richards who recorded 9,514 metres. A 3,000 metres undercard race was won by Brentwood Beagle Celia Cordon who clocked 22:29.5. Barnet's Steve Allen (one of two competing with that name, as Ilford's version was also in the 'A' race) walked to-and-from the venue and is soon to return to his Polish residence. It was good to see him on his brief return to Blighty we wish him a safe journey, and also look forward to welcoming him on his next UK visit.

#### SURREY WALKING CLUB'S 125th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION LUNCH

Held in Central London (Waterloo), it filled a function room at the Union Jack Club, a Club for ex-Service personnel. Excellently organised jointly by the Club's President Chris Flint and Social supremo Trevor Sliwerski, it got a good start as each arrival was offered a complimentary drink at the bar, the location for a pre-lunch gathering. Many had travelled long distances, some from overseas, and was occasion to

meet up with old colleagues and - indeed - old rivals, as Surrey Walking Club had invited members of other Clubs to share in their day's celebration. Many past races and social functions (such as Gazette Nights) were recounted, proving that so many have retained great memories to recall such activities and experiences. Our M/C, Club President Chris Flint, kept the function moving along at the right pace. Exserviceman, Dave Ainsworth, was called upon to say grace, after which a fine 3-course repast was served. Speeches during this occasion reminded folk of many good - and successful - times in the Club's history, and of notable members both past and present. One gloomy note was mention of the number of purely "Walking Clubs" which had been part of our athletics scene - and of how few now existed - of which Surrey Walking Club were proudly one of them. A special tribute was spoken by Peter Selby to honour those who'd been on the books for 50 years or more, some of whom were present. As was fitting in an ex-Service Club, mention was made of 29 members who'd fallen in The Great War and of a memorial to them - and of 4 members known to have died in World War II. A specific reference was made to the high number of Centurions with SWC connections. Special presentations were made to a Past President Roger Michell and to current wearer of the Chain, Chris Flint. A guest of honour was your current Race Walking Association President Chris Hobbs who gave the final speech - before all stood for a loyal toast to our King. While the function was in progress a menu/programme was circulated around tables for signing - to be sent to double Israeli 50 Kilometres' Olympian Shaul Ladany, a Concentration Camp and Munich Massacre survivor, who was thought about in these troubling Middle East times. Shaul showed great form in Surrey's flagship London-to-Brighton races, returning to participate in their final one. Too many notables present to list all - but before dispersing - many to the bar to reignite old memories and catch up with old friends and acquaintances, group photographs of attenders were taken - which will grace the Club's history books.

# Dear Dave ...

#### **COMMENT ON RECENT DAILY MAIL ARTICLE by Bill Sutherland**

I read with great interest your reply article entitled 'You can walk but never run.' I started as a Race Walker in 1963 greatly motivated by Don Thompson (1960 Gold Medallist Rome Olympics 50 Kms

Walk) and thereafter by Ken Matthews (1964 Gold Medallist Tokyo Olympics 20 Kms Walk) and Paul Nihill (1964 Silver Medallist in the 50Kms Walk). They were true fast race walkers and fair too reaching speeds well in excess of 8 miles per hour. With persistent hard training and racing I represented Great Britain on 8 occasions and won a Bronze Medal for Scotland in Edinburgh over 20 Miles in the Commonwealth Games. I was taught how to race walk with style and speed by Highgate Harriers and Met. Police Race Walking Club, where on each stride you would flow from heel to toe under constant supervision of experienced Judges. If one fast-forwards to the present day where we have professional race walkers compared to amateurs of yesteryear (I worked as a Beat Policeman in Metropolitan Police throughout my International career) speeds now reached are around 9 to 10 miles per hour faster than a good class runner can run! It has sadly become impossible to judge by the human eye and technology is well overdue, but resisted as it would heavily expose the many breaking contact. I would be most grateful if you could print my views and forward them to Emma Simpson who wrote in the Answer to Correspondents Column. Thanks again so much for highlighting my favourite athletic event.



<u>Writes Hon Ed</u>: Will refers to a much talented **Ken Tuson**, who was part of Southend-on-Sea AC's walking squad who were our Country's best during the early-to-mid 70s, with a host of big names on their books, backed up by Club regulars. Ken was a victim of "the star system" in that most team races were 4-to-score, which made it difficult for him to be in such 4-stong teams. But he forced his way on a number of occasions. Popular Ken was a legend at Stock Exchange AC, where he had a forte for distance races. Indeed, he relished the challenge of a London-to-Brighton Walk in excess of 50 miles -turning out in 12 consecutive events from 1964-to-1975 (inclusive). This saw him at 14th in the all-time list of finishers, with a best time of 9 hours 4 minutes and 32 seconds when winning in 1971. This after

an epic contest again his Southend club colleague Jimmy Venn who came 2nd in 9:06.03 as stalwart Dave Stevens completed the frame in 9:16.27. It was a close race throughout which all hinged on who had the most left in them after they'd reached the top of an infamous Dale Hill on the A23, before a 7-and-half miles descent towards the Brighton seafront finish.

A MOST UNFORTUNATE MISHAP writes Australian Centurion No13 Tim Erickson:

I had a big bike crash on a Saturday morning and came down super heavy on my left-hand chest side. Basically, the front wheel caught in a rut and did not want to follow my lead as I was turning left. So I went left but the bike did not and down I came on a cement path. I knew I had hurt the ribs but soldiered on for a few days until the pain got so bad that I had to go to the doctor. From there I was directed to the emergency department of our major Melbourne hospital. Scans showed fractures in 10 of the 12 left ribs and I was immediately put into hospital. The doctors were pretty impressed that I could carry on at home for 4 days after such a severe fall. I think we old walkers must have a pretty high pain threshold! I have been home now 3 days but not able to do much apart from sitting around reading or sleeping or watching TV. With such a big fall I suspect it will be a couple of months to recover. But it could have been worse - I did not hit my head or fall on my replacement hip. So, all ok overall but feeling very sore and discomforted.

Adds Hon Ed: One race from his 1980 British visit was in Essex - Basildon - which hosted our RWA National 50K Championship on a Saturday afternoon around a near deserted Industrial Estate, with local organisers being a late much missed Arthur Croft and a still just going Dave Ainsworth. "Race Walking Record's" account describes Tim as being "in a class of his own". Indeed Tim was when winning in 4:10.33 well ahead of Denis Jackson 4:16.25 with Brian Adams completing the frame in 4:23.01. 168 entered and, perhaps put off by Basildon's reputation, many scratched leaving 97 starters, from whom 71 finished. 13 teams lined up - 9 finished with a top 3 order being Leicester/Sheffield/York Postal. In those days most industrial factories didn't work Saturdays so we, more or less, had this course to ourselves with few people (or cars) about. Much was on a cycle path, which saw little bicycle action. It passed a Ford Radiator Plant (now closed) where the late John Webb once worked and a large Carreras factory which churned out Craven 'A' and Black Cat cigarettes. Outside was a huge black cat statue - and 50K walkers must have got fed up seeing it. This factory closed in 1984 with a loss of 1,200 jobs. A tractor factory, now under new ownership, continues - but with a manufacturing industry decline, most factories closed over the years and there's now a large Retail Park. This attracts so many cars, no walking races would ever be held in this vicinity. The 50K race experienced all the elements - from torrential downpour which saw water running over walkers' racing shoes, followed by hot sunshine - so strong that roads dried completely as we raced. These conditions alternated as the afternoon wore on. A presentation was held in the Ford Sports & Social Club's taproom, where changing facilities and car parking was provided. Indeed, happy memories for Tim, for whom we all wish a speedy recovery from his setback. Australian Centurion No 13 Tim's their Secretary and the previous Editor of "Heel-and-Toe" (now it's Australian Centurion No 5 Stu Cooper) which although an Australian newsletter, is widely read with enthusiasm in Blighty. Why? - as Tim has many "connections in high places" so often publishing "breaking news" before we hear it from British sources. Just 2 instances were rumblings that Olympic 50K Walks were heading for the buffers - and - road walking would be ditched from Birmingham's Commonwealth Games card in favour of two 10,000 metres track races. Nobody who was in a "behind closed doors smoke-filled room" notified those in our British race walking scene - we had to read it in an Australian Newsletter. There's nothing like communication - and in that room - there was nothing like communication. We thank Tim for his many "scoops". Finally, when Basildon's Olly Flynn won a 1978 Commonwealth Games 30K gold medal in Edmonton, it was Tim who stepped up to the podium to be presented with a bronze medal - as Brian Adams and Amos Seddon were 4th and 5th respectively.
