70th ANNIVERSARY SOUTHEND BOXING DAY PIER RACE

All race walkers were warmly invited by host Club - Southend City AC - to race this **70th** anniversary event, offering 2 miles out-and-back into the Thames Estuary along planks of the World's longest pleasure pier. It was an opportunity to meet up with former Southend-on-Sea AC (as then called) international and 1970 20 Miles' Walk Commonwealth Games representative octogenarian **Dave Rosser**, nowadays Spanish based. Boxing Day is a busy one for athletics Clubs as so many stage races on this day. Walking often had such races - perhaps the most popular being

organised by Borough of Enfield Harriers (as then called) in the '60 and '70s which started/finished from a spartan town centre mission hall. It was traditional road walking and took in posher parts of the town - such as Bush Hill Park - where it passed athletics journalist and statistician Ross McWhirter's house in Village Road. This a location of his 1975 doorstep assassination (2 assassins served life sentences before a 1999 Good Friday Agreement release). A 3 miles' road walk, attended by walkers from far-and-wide, ended with a well-attended presentation buffet in an upstairs function room at an Enfield Town Centre public house, at which those in running races also were present. Essex Walker gave this front page top billing and especially appealed to walkers to come and meet Dave Rosser, especially ones with past Southend connections. Results aren't yet to hand, so we hope to see a few walkers' names. In past times walkers used to appear - so many that someone offered to put up a cup for us. Recently few, sometimes none, have accepted Southend's kind invitation to join in. Prior to 2024 our last walker in contention was Prittlewell-based Steve Allen, who on that occasion was our only participant. Southend's former racewalker June Cork continues showing enthusiasm for getting us involved in this long-established fixture and here's her report:

2 Miles. It was a successful 70th Anniversary yesterday - and from the various comments postrace, everyone seemed to enjoy the race and the atmosphere [a great relief both to Mike and me]. Young Mr Rosser [now an octogenarian of course] ran there and back without any problem, as did his daughter Claire and her partner Daniel. The event was won, unsurprisingly, by Adam Hickey, our former Cross Country International, now back to his awesome running form. So, two former Internationals in one race is pretty good - a pity we failed to get a combo picture of the two of them together. Never mind. Results not to hand at present but I'll let you know as soon as I receive.

HOME IN TIME FOR CHRISTMAS - AND A BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

Here's a message I received from Tony Roost - son of **Ken Roost** - who has left hospital after another spell as an in-patient. Ex-Royal Air Force Representative walker Ken's **94th birthday** was on Boxing Day. Ken qualified as a Centurion at Ewhurst in 1975 (22:03.26) but really hit the jackpot on the same course in 1979 when 10th, going sub-20 hours **(19:52.53)** closely followed by C577 Jack Rossitter (20:02.43) and the late Peter Worth C491 (20:20.44) - who together formed a winning team (then called Borough of Enfield Harriers), beating 2 top Netherlands teams who were 2nd and 3rd. That 1979 Ewhurst race saw a record 107 starters/78 finishers/37 new Centurions - all records for UK 100 miles races! For many years Ken frequently was an Enfield League pointsman at Donkey Lane and Lee Valley. It's really good that Ken was discharged from hospital in time for Christmas and a 94th birthday celebration.

Writes **Tony Roost**: "He's been in hospital and should be on his way home as I type. He has been pretty tired lately which has led to him getting confused. Hopefully he will get back to normal."

MARK SHEARMAN

An octogenarian who'd photographed so many race walkers in his time, particularly for Athletics Weekly (AW), has retired. A recipient of many awards, he began in 1962 only putting his camera down in 2023 after the National Cross Country relays in Mansfield. He was behind the lens at 14 Olympics and at all World Championships (bar 2022 in Eugene, Oregon), other major Games plus countless other events. His first Olympics was in Tokyo (1964) - when 4 British athletes struck gold, including our Ken Matthews who dominated the 20 Kilometres Walk. Mark's pictures were featured in AW, and elsewhere, as Ken triumphantly strode around a cinder track (the last Olympics held on one) to finish well ahead of the silver medallist - to be greeted by his wife Sheila who'd leapt from the crowd to embrace him. In his active times he was a 2.48 marathon finisher. Mark declared London's 2012 Olympic Games



as his best event. His most treasured possession was an MBE awarded "for services to sports photography". He operated mainly at the higher levels of athletics, so our more talented race walkers were those captured on film by Mark. He was well thought of by all athletes including walkers who, it must be said, were sometimes caught "up" by the photographer.

Word has reached us from Bristol, where he'd resided, that a glass or two was raised in his honour to mark the date: 21 December. Basildon AC's John Webb RIP - a true worthy and one never to be forgotten.

World Athletics changes walks to Half Marathon and Marathon - The Sports Examiner

"The World Athletics Council approved the introduction of new official senior road distances for race walking events, in order to help put the remarkable achievements by athletes into context, make the events more relatable for fans, and encourage mass participation. The standard senior distances for race walking will therefore change from:



- 20 km race walk to half marathon race walk (21.0975km)
- 35 km race walk to marathon race walk (42.195km)

These changes will be implemented starting 1 January 2026 in senior World Athletics Series events."

World Athletics President **Sebastian Coe** (GBR) explained:

"I think we've made the right decision today to make it more relatable to Half Marathon and Marathon. The fact that you've got race walkers that will cover that marathon distance in just under three hours, I think sort of places it into a greater context for people watching the event. Our attempts in all our innovations is to lend a little bit more understanding and context to our fans, and we recognize that at the major games, a large chunk of our fan base that watching probably may well be watching the sport for the first time, so our innovation is - there's a very clear rationale behind it - it is to try and make more understandable, more salient, more relevant these events."

The 20 km walk has been part of the Olympic program since 1956 for men and 2000 for women and the 50 km walk was a men's event from 1932 to Tokyo 2020, but was not held at Paris 2024. World Athletics changed the 50 km event to 35 km for men and women for the 2022 World Championships. Now, all of these events are out and the new half marathon and marathon distances will be installed. As for the status of these new distances in the Olympic Games, Coe noted: "I think that is a question that is best directed at the [IOC] Program Commission and the Sports Department. What we've said is race walk is secure in our World Championships."

AND THERE'S MORE

lan Richards writes: I think you should also circulate the other major change that effects the under 20 age group. **10km WA championships are being replaced by 5000m with effect from 2026**. This is not getting a mention in many of the posts but will be important both for athletes and their coaches.

MAJOR CHANGES - HON ED's VIEW

When announced that a new race walking event - a mixed gender Marathon Relay - was to make its Olympic debut at the 2024 Paris Games - there was "A Chorus of Disapproval" (to borrow a title of an Alan Ayckbourn play). Many stated strong objections and Hon Ed agreed - but also added that, as it was going ahead anyway, it was sad GB couldn't raise even a 2-person team. Come the day many had to - and indeed did - admit it'd been a great success. This based on evidence it'd attracted more crowds of spectators than both Olympic 20k walks as well as generating considerably more media attention and resultant publicity. OK, some of that was because it was something new. Nevertheless it proved a hit, even without GB participation. A new idea of altering distances has a potential to do likewise and offers more hope for race walking's future than proverbial "gambler's last throw" attempted solutions which have been tried in past decades - and optimistically still are! DA

MAJOR CHANGES – READERS' REACTIONS

These changes have been widely circulated and included in many sporting publications - including our Race Walking Association's own "Race Walking Record".

• Good move. About time; I always thought the Race Walking authority's snub to the London Marathon invitation was a short sighted isolationist decision. After all, the first popular running mass marathon event which was started by Fred Lebow in the USA - New York - showed the way again with the inclusion of a Race Walk section with the major prize being a car! Our five time Olympian walker Chris Maddocks was second to a future world champion (Carlos Mercenario of Mexico) in the process beating Russian Andrej Perlov the then current 50km world record holder! I won the race walking section of the Kharkiv Marathon in 1991, the fiftieth anniversary of the tank battle of Kursk. Ed Shillabeer C590

- I don't share Edmund's enthusiasm for the major championship changes; this is because I prefer the 20km and 50km traditional distances. Accepting those are seemingly consigned to history, the move towards the half and full marathon walk events would at least suggest there is a future for Championship race walks in the short to medium term at least. Not sure about the next 100 years but then again, few sports are likely to escape the grip by 21st century decision-makers intent on spicing things up for the sake of it. Thanks, Ed for remembering my 1989 New York Marathon and reminding us of your Kharkiv walk. For my part it was an exciting time to be very fit, injury free and competitive against some of the fastest men in the world Mercenario (1st 3.11.55), Perlov, Bo Gustaffson, a trio of top Italians including Maurizio Damilano. All-time greats. Looking ahead, it's a sobering thought to anticipate sub 3 marathon walks. Some things have changed. Chris Maddocks
- I completely agree with this. Our existing metric distances are totally meaningless to 99.99% of the general public. Since numeracy is rare these days many people assume that a 3h30min 50kms walk is vastly inferior to a marathon in the same time. It may not save race walking on its own but it will help. Without change our event will disappear in the next few years. **Steve Uttley**

- The change to half and full marathon seems a good call? People can relate to those distances

- My first reaction is lukewarm. *Tony Taylor*
- With regard to the changes, I simply do not recognise half marathon and marathon as relating to the past memorable history of Race Walking as that was 20 and 50 Kms. It is just a publicity stunt by Seb Coe and World Athletics as they now recognise that race walking has become one of the most popular and largely participated events in the Athletics programme. Can you recall back in the 80's when they said participating levels in the 50 kms was too low and not long ago they didn't want the 50 kms as it took too long and logistics for it was too much! Following that they changed to 35 kms for male and female now they prefer 42 kms. On the plus side it provides a future for the race walks in World Athletics, but at a massive cost to the illustrious history of our sport. On the UK side our so-called race walkers just about reach 10 kms, so without a massive change in our racing programme with a publicity drive to bring in new aspiring champions how are we going to have GB Race Walkers of Major Games level in the future? NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Hall of Fame - England Athletics (5:05 mins)

At an upmarket presentation Evening held at Leicester's Athena Events Venue, 8 worthies were inducted into the England Athletics Hall-of-Fame. The "Class of 2024" were: Charles Bennett RIP (GB's first Olympic athletic gold medallist in 1900), Lorna Booth MBE (double Commonwealth Games medallist who has given a lifetime of



service to athletics), Robbie Grabarz (Olympic, European and World high jump medallist), Stan Greenberg (nonagenarian Ace statistician who spent decades working alongside BBC commentators), Nicola Sanders (highly rated 400 metres runner), Richard Whitehead (talented paralympic runner), Jenny Meadows and Trevor Painter (both highly respected coaches). Alas no race walkers - this time - so roll on 2025.

PAUL DICKENSON RIP

Paul Dickenson: Former BBC athletics commentator dies aged 74 - BBC Sport

All athletes, irrespective of their chosen disciplines, will be sorry to learn of double-Olympian (1976/80) Paul's departure aged 74. He was a good friend of race walking, as was so often co-commentator Stuart Storey (happily retired aged 82). Paul was a former Ilford AC Annual Dinner & Dance guest speaker, who went down very well. Paul won 5 consecutive English Schools hammer titles and was UK record holder for this event in 1976. His nearest to major Games awards were at the 1978 and 1982 Commonwealth Games when finishing just outside the medals. After finishing in top class athletics he made a name for himself in commentary boxes for over 20 years. He began by meeting David Coleman at Crystal Palace and stating, "I want your job". A few months' later BBC sought a trackside reporter/interviewer, and legendary Mr Coleman recalled meeting Paul. He excelled and was promoted into the commentary box. Paul once said, "You've got to make it sound easy. I might be commentating to an auntie or an uncle who might not know anything about athletics, so you've got to make it sound very simple". As commentator he'd many strings to his bow: Summer and Winter Olympics, Paralympics, many other major Games, Strongman events, Royal Events and at other public occasions. Paul was on commentary duty when Jonathan Edwards set a world record with an 18.29 leap in the triple jump (or hop, step and jump as old timers more accurately call it). His career as a silvery-tongued maestro of the small screen ended after a series of mini-strokes in 2014. Paul hailed from North Shields where he'd married his childhood sweetheart Ann, whom he leaves behind along with 2 daughters and 4 grandchildren - to whom we express our condolences on a passing of one who truly made his mark.

Peter and Marion Fawkes write: "So sad to learn of the passing of Paul Dickenson. Paul was a North Shields Poly athlete and was the middle of a trio of prominent hammer throwers to come out of that club: Bruce Fraser, Paul and Ian Chipchase who were all GB Internationals. All 3 were trained by Carl Johnson, who was National Hammer Throws coach. Carl also trained another NSP athlete: Arthur Mackenzie in the discus who also became a GB International. Arthur in later life became a well-respected Playwright and author of a good few books ranging from murder mysteries to TV programmes (the Likely lads being one in which he wrote the scripts for a good few episodes). His autobiography is a

very good read! Bruce was the inspiration for both Paul and Ian, with Paul going on to be GB Team Captain and in later years a much-respected BBC Sports commentator on both Athletic events and the World's Strongest Man programmes. Ian won Commonwealth Gold in Christchurch before promptly retiring. Both Marion and I trained with the Poly at the same time as all of these fine athletes and I can truly say that all of them were truly inspiring. RIP Paul."
