RACE WALKING ASSOCIATION AGM

It was on Friday 10 January by *Zoom*, successfully repeating a previously used procedure, which enabled all to "attend" without venturing to travel in sub-zero temperatures. RWA President Chris Hobbs exercised his right to Chair this meeting, which he did so efficiently - managing to conclude all business in 1 hour 7 minutes.

Generally speaking, a small AGM turnout indicates folk are content with how an Organisation is being run. Attendance list was 20, and among them it was nice to see Essex stalwart of years' past, Kevin Perry (now Worcestershire-based) among them. Essex did well with 3 from Ilford attending plus one apology for absence from an Essex Club member. A special welcome was given to those attending for a first time. The President welcomed all and stated how he'd enjoyed the year in office. He singled out spending a week at the Paris Olympics during which he'd spectated all 3 walks, which included an inaugural Mixed Relay, commenting it was better than watching break dancing (now also an Olympic "sport"). He made positive remarks about our English Schools Championships continued staging of race walks. He called for silence in respect of walkers who'd passed-on since our previous AGM, and to be positive again, the number was thankfully much less this time. No nominations of likely candidates were received - yet again - for the posts of President and President-Elect, so Chris offered to again continue, having just completed extra time with our Chain of Office, as nobody stepped forward last year either. More senior readers (well, older ones) can vividly recall, decades' ago, how many walking officials used to engage in *heated* discussions as to who should next get our President's chain? *Tempus fugit.*

Honorary Secretary Colin Vesty informed the meeting he'd done as best as he could, with other commitments on his time. With no nominations received (for Secretary or Assistant Secretary), he was prepared to continue for the time being and would review his situation later in the year. Ideally, he'd like to see a new Secretary and he then offered to fulfil an Assistant Secretary role in order to give what assistance and advice he could to a new elected Secretary. From the floor, Len Ruddock suggested a salary might be considered for the Secretary role? Len was thanked for his suggestion, which is to be considered in Committee. *Watch this space.*

Mark Easton's annual Honorary Treasurer's report was - yet again - immaculate. Mark was thanked for such a well-presented annual report. Re-elected Hon Championship Secretary Noel Carmody reported that National Championships for seniors had attracted abysmal support with low take-ups and poor support. Come on readers, don't you want to support races which give opportunities to achieve National Champion medallist status? Have a rethink for 2025 - as these races are put on for you. Noel was complimented on how he'd so nicely summed up the situation and thanked for the amount of time he'd given to this task.

Long-serving Pam Ficken was re-elected as Honorary Trophies Secretary. Good news as 2 missing trophies had been located: The Edgar Horton Trophy and The Lancashire Trophy - so those seeking them can now call off searches. RWA Chairman Glyn Jones thanked Pam for her work in this role and stated this position is *"a thankless task"*. From the floor Len Ruddock suggested persons receiving trophies could have them long enough to have photographs taken - then handed back for safekeeping, so eliminating now annual cups and shields searches. It was confirmed all trophies taken away were signed for. An Officer stated that keeping all in one place would require *"a huge loft"* plus increased insurance premiums. Trophies were acknowledged as important as they've links with history.

With no nominations received for custody of the Chairman's gavel, Glyn Jones offered to continue, though suggested a younger newcomer should be considered at the next AGM. Another true stalwart John Eldrich, was thanked for volunteering to continue as the Association's Honorary Auditor.

championships in Sheffield certainly managed to attract a number of new, young race walkers. If you know of a local coach or athletics club that might be interested in race walk coaching/development, then please pass on information about this opportunity.

"WELCOME HOME"

This title of a 1973 Peters and Lee No1 hit certainly applies to Kevin Perry's return to Blighty after many years of residence in France. A popular race walker on our Essex scene, Kevin was part of a strong Southend-on-Sea AC (as then called) squad, based in the then town (now a City). Kevin relished the challenges of longer distances, joining The Centurions as No 912 in 1993 at Battersea Park when competing in the Surrey Walking Club/Metropolitan Police WC 'London 200 Kilometres' reaching 100 miles in 22:02.32. Big fields in such times as 105 started/58 finished/53 completed 100 miles/25 new Centurions. The famous "Southend Support Squad" were on hand to celebrate his achievement. Kevin became a long-distance regular with another 8 successful 100 Miles completions, including attaining 2002 National Champion status in Lancashire Walking Club's 24 hours race on Blackpool Track when covering 182.591k as London Vidarians claimed team honours. 35 started/23 finished/19 reached 100 miles/3 new Centurions - of whom, 2 were from the host Club - aptly named J Hardy and Hazel Fairhurst, the other new member being Manxman J Stubbs. Kevin is now to be found in Lyppard Hanford some 2 miles east of Worcester. Kevin was an attendee at our Race Walking Association AGM on *Zoom*.

Writes Kevin: "I'm now residing in Worcestershire. My sister lives local and Kath my wife has family nearby. We are still finding our way around this area but so far we have only been met with kindness. I've been keeping active and out with regular walks with my dog but on the 16th of this month I will be meeting up with a group to train up for the park runs, I'll be walking ... I will talk further on this when I have more information because I understand the coach (female) is an international and has competed in ultra distance ... that's to be verified ... THE CENTURIONS HUNDREDTH 100 MILES RACE



A hundredth 100 miles walking race to be staged in Britain is to be held on Lewes track (East Sussex) on 16/17 August, which it's hoped many readers will attend. There's talk of a function to celebrate this true milestone. To build up to this occasion Essex Walker delved into tales from some past races, to be featured in our editions. We start with Ilford 's **Steve King** from a 1972 Leicester-to-Skegness, in which 65 started/41 finished and Steve became Centurion 492 in 21:29.17. That race was won by C464 Dave Boxall in 17:58.49 with C488 John Lees 2nd (18:15.34). Other finishers of note included Squadron Leader Mike Perkins (20:05:32) who retired to Woodbridge and came to support races such as our memorable 400th Essex League race at Chelmsford (Springfield) held in memory of C413 John Hedgethorne and at 100s in Colchester's Lower Castle

Park, future RWA President C491 Peter Worth (20:617), London Vidarian C500 Jim Williams (23:02.54) who proudly wore a blazer badge with C 'D' on it (*work it out*) and another RAF man Ron Boxell MBE, BEM (23:33.25) - yes 2 civil honours: an RAF Physical Training Officer based at Chivenor in Devon his BEM came as a Warrant Officer and when higher up the ladder as a Flight Lieutenant, received an MBE. Two milestone occasions saw finisher John Eddershaw record a 10th successful 100 miles and legendary Hew Neilson record his 20th and last over the distance - both were seen at many more events in future years. Steve King had two sub-9 hours' Stock Exchange London-to-Brighton finishes in his career (1973 8:48.56/1976 8:44.19 - both occasions 2nd, respectively to John Nye and Adrian James). On becoming a Centurion Steve received a congratulatory telegram from Ilford AC Chairman Bill Cockle (Centurion 117). Recently Essex Walker featured a current picture of Steve plus an interview he gave about his commentary work in Canada - which saw him honoured by induction into the British Columbia Athletics Hall-of-Fame. Steve and Jean have visited England a few times, one of which we feature in this article which Steve penned shortly after the event. <u>C492 Steve King Centurions</u>

In 2014 Ilford AC celebrated a 40th anniversary of the first time they'd finished a full team of 3 (Dave Neagle/Alan Barber/Dave Ainsworth) in a 100-miles walk (no classified finishes those days - you only made result sheets if doing the lot) and a 40th anniversary of a European Championship 20K Walk in the heat of Rome when Roger Mills earned a coveted bronze medal. 33 walkers (including attendants

from the 1974 Leicester-to-Skegness) and their guests attended at "The Harrow" in Hornchurch, including 13 Centurions - it could have been more as 2 rescinded bookings as an RWA Commonwealth Games Tribute Luncheon was to be held 2 days' later at the Tower Hotel.

Pride of place at this presentation was a trophy for Chelmsford-based Jon May as "*Enfield League Official-of-the-Year*" for his efficient and appreciated work keeping our the League tables. Jon, an active participant who turns out for Enfield, got a special loud round of applause as it was his **74th** birthday. Such is the Enfield League's friendly nature, as started by Martin Oliver in 1998 (it was a "**Martin Oliver Tribute Race**") that Ron called for applause for our tea lady at the upstairs function room counter. No wonder an Ilford walker once wrote that the Enfield League "*is the total package*". **Well said.** Among those few in the park was former

Ilford and Post Office walker George Wood, once an Essex resident, now living in nearby Chingford. An early League participant, he instantly recognised Dave Ainsworth and Steve Allen - who in turn recognised him. George intends coming along as a spectator at future events.

A "MILESTONE" 60th

Belated best birthday wishes to Hilary McDermott BSc, PhD & SFHEA (Senior Fellowship of the Higher Education Academy), who reached that "milestone" occasion on 4 January. Now a Professor at Loughborough University, Hilary first appeared on our race walking scene in the 1970s when attending races, with her brother Philip - who joined the Met reaching Inspector rank - in which her much-missed father Lew Mockett was a leading competitor (for Woodford Green AC, Ilford AC and Metropolitan Police Race Walking Club, where he'd served as Honorary Secretary). Hilary belongs to *4Life-Tri-Club* and in recent times Hilary's name has been on result sheets for Charnwood AC in evening Masters track races and at Midlands League events. Hilary and Philip organised a wonderful memorial event to the late Lew and Brenda Mockett at a Littlehampton Bowls Club at which both had played to a high standard and held offices. During this occasion, attended by a number of race walkers, a bench with their names on was unveiled. In a past decade llford AC entered a team in a National 100 x 1 mile track run. For any Club finding 100 different athletes on one afternoon requires some effort and when Lew (who'd volunteered to appear) was called into work at short notice for an emergency), rather than let the side down he handed his llford AC vest to Hilary and asked her to represent his name by running a mile at Ashton's Playing Fields track (Ilford & Woodford Green AC jointly stage their efforts, to economise on track hire fees).

"ATHLETICS WEEKLY" TO REACH 80 YEARS

Later in the year this publication is to celebrate 80 years. In December 1945 a pocket-sized 24-page publication, started by ex-Royal Air Force man Jimmy Green, arrived on the scene. By the end of 1949 5,000 copies per edition were being sold. Its title was "*Athletics*" before changing its name to "*Athletics Weekly*" on 7 January 1950 when it cost *sixpence* for 16 pages. It's still going - so let's see plenty of excellent race walking results in their pages!

MONEY GOES TO WORTHY RECIPIENTS

Congratulations to the latest prize winners in your Race Walking Association 200 Club Draw, who are Chris Flint, Steve Wynn and Lancashire Walking Club. All 3 are noted for considerable contributions to our chosen discipline. Chris had been RWA Southern Area Honorary Secretary for nearly 3 decades, he's had 2 spells as The Centurions Honorary Secretary, served long terms as a Metropolitan Police Walking Club Chairman, RWA Minutes Secretary and - for good measure - a term as



Veterans AC Walking Secretary. He stepped forward at a Veterans AC AGM when a new Walking Secretary was needed - as he felt embarrassed when not one had walker offered to fill the post, expecting others to do the job for us. Chris was the last President of a now defunct London Vidarians and has worn a President's Chain at Surrey Walking Club with distinction. RWA Life Member Chis has also twice been RWA Long Distance Champion (1997/2007) and twice Isle of Man 85 Miles Parish Walk winner (1997/99). Steve, also a current SWC member is forever linked with the Post Office. He won the Post Office-in-Uniform Walk 5 years in succession (1987-to-82) including a year it was covered by television. Steve organised many 9k yacht handicap races around hilly upmarket Blackheath Park. He has a good London-to-Brighton finish on his record: 1980 13th (from 39) in 9:45.24 when just pipped by Leicester's Chris Bent in a race won by the host Club's Peter Selby. Steve's also on a Battersea Park 100 miles programme - but scratched owing to a work commitment. Lancashire Walking Club have a wonderful history with individual members winning and highly placed in so many Championships and Open races, with among them many Centurions. Nowadays, despite race walking fields struggling to maintain numbers. Lancashire WC enthusiastically continue staging frequent events for North West participants with those from elsewhere always made welcome. A GREAT FRIEND OF ESSEX WALKING TO REACH 80

International distance race walker of note John Lees is to reach this "milestone" on Sunday 23 February, and we all wish him well. When a '70's European Friendship Walk weekend was staged, 3 events were for teams from various countries and the Isle-of-Man Crown Dependency. Saturday afternoon saw a 20k walk along quiet lanes north of Springfield - starting/finishing at Chelmer Village ASDA Superstore. Later all assembled at a hotel in Chelmsford's centre for an evening dinner - ending with a Sunday morning track meeting at Cricklefields Stadium in downtown Ilford, followed by drinks in "The Cauliflower" opposite the track (now boarded up). Gifted commentator for competitive races was John Lees of Brighton and Hove AC. John had a way with words and became a full-time sports reporter and presenter with BBC Radio Brighton, then BBC Radio Sussex. John covered all sports, and when Essex County cricket team visited Sussex, Essex Radio's Sports Editor Roger Buxton (who attended our memorable 2012 Olympian walkers' tribute luncheon at the Tower Hotel) booked John as a match broadcaster. In 1972 John walked across America setting a new coast-to-coast record of 53-and-a-half days. Big Walk 72 - 2,891 miles - John Lees. His build-up to that epic feat included walking 1,189 miles from John O'Groats-to-Land's End. In July '72 John entered the Leicester-to-Skegness 100 miles and led most of the way, until overtaken in the latter stages by clubmate Dave Boxall. Dave and John were the 1-2, John being the first new Centurion qualifier. Another long distance feat was televised on Esther Rantzen's popular "That's Life" show. A viewer purchased a faulty pram - when complained about, a manufacturer asked her to return it to their factory - which was over 70 miles' away. John was contacted to walk this pram (at pace) to the manufacturer, and return it after repair. Great stuff!

The '70s saw Olympic race walking problems, as after terrible events at Munich in '72 it was decided to trim the Games, and a number of events across the board were removed. Race walking saw a removal of a 1976 50K plus a statement that the 20K at those Games would be a last and therefore no race walking would appear in 1980. Many top walkers combined to lead a campaign, which was wholeheartedly supported by clubmen, ex-race walkers and officials (plus many from other athletics events). It must be said John was one of the *"leading lights"* in our successful campaign for scrapping such proposals - and was to the fore in our top publicity stunt - a *"March on Parliament"* by race walkers in kit, where on arrival a House of Commons room was booked for The Minister for Sport, Right Honourable Denis Howell PC, MP, to make a speech. It was in National newspapers - and featured on main BBC1 National News bulletins. **Victory** - a dropped 50K was reinstated in 1980 and an expected 20K demise didn't happen.

Ilford went on to win the John Hedgethorne Memorial Trophy, awarded to the Club with most participants (19). He qualified as a Centurion at the classic 1968 Leicester-to-Skegness 100 Miles in 22:40.42. The winner was Karl Abolins (a 3rd successive 100 Miles victory) with John Hedgethorne 2nd, by one second from Mark Kastelijns. 56 started/32 finished/15 new Centurions. It was remembered for the cold, as temperatures never rose above 50 degrees F. Dave's eldest son Andy, also Leicester WC, became Centurion 1076 at Newmarket's 2009 Barclay Bicentenary Event clocking 23:21.41.



CENTURION'S SAD DEATH WHILE IN ACTION

We're sorry to learn that **Centurion 996 Jos Van Gorp** tragically died when struck by a vehicle whilst participating in the Open Borders Walking event at Postel (Belgium). A member of Rotterdam Walking Club, Jos was killed instantly. Jos qualified in a joint SWC/London Vidarians 100 Miles race at Newmarket's Rowley Mile racecourse in July 2003 when clocking 22:58.46. Resume Jos van Gorp

The race saw 72 starters/31 finishers/1 DQ/17 new Centurions. For Essex Walker readers it's forever remembered as that great occasion when Peter Ryan won in 19:57.35, less than a minute ahead of fast closing C927 Willem Mutze who clocked 19:58.30. Peter suffered fatigue in the closing stages and leaned to one side - yet showed all his grit and "Sheffield Steel" to "dig deep" over a dramatic last circuit in order to break the tape. Among new Centurions were C986 Cath Duhig (Ryston Runners), current Centurions President Dave Jones C987 (Yorkshire WC), C997 Andrew Wilmot (Halstead Road Runners) who we saw racing at July's Moulton 5, C998 Dave Evans (Lancashire WC), C999 John Searson (Spartan AC of Jersey) who's also an Atlantic rower - and wait for it - the lady who earned that coveted No 1000 membership badge Wendy Watson of the Long Distance Walkers' Association. For statistical '*nerds*', Wendy, despite proudly wearing badge No 1000, isn't their thousandth member - as numbers



99 and 454 were never issued (it's a long story fully covered in Centurions Handbooks). The thousandth member came a year later in Essex, at the London Vidarians 100 Miles around Colchester's Lower Castle Park, when Badge No 1002 was claimed by Gerrit van Haandel of RWV (Holland) in 21:40.08. That day 48 started/24 finished/1DQ/13 new Centurions. Ilford AC's C1001 Kevin Marshall was the first of those new Centurions clocking 21:01.27.

WRITES AN ALL-TIME GREAT

As always, thank you for the Essex Newsletter. Amid all the positive news it is a sad fact of life that you'll report on those either departed or ill. My best

wishes go out to those struggling including, Julian Hopkins, once our national coach and all-round good guy.

It was a shock to learn of Paul Dickenson's passing. I met him on several occasions. Reference Mark Shearman's retirement, in 2000 Mark came to my home in Plymouth (a flat above Ed Shillabeer's veterinary surgery) from where a day-long photo-shoot started and resulted in a 4-page Athletics Weekly spread prior to the Sydney Olympics. Paul was well acknowledged by you, Dave, together with notable memories recalled by Peter and Marion Fawkes. Paul was indeed a good friend to those in race walking; I believe he and Paul Blagg were close as club mates. I had an opportunity to fondly refer to Paul Dickenson a number of times in the closing stages of my autobiography. He was an excellent MC at a posh British athletics awards

Few people were surprised when Jonathan Edwards received the award for male athlete of the year. Mark Lewis-Francis was an outstanding favourite for the junior male award. Winning the 100 metre sprint in Cuba was a great achievement. He had been given a generous round of applause when Dickenson announced his name. Tongue-tied, the black teenager had managed a few customary thank-you acknowledgements before strutting off stage.

Denise Lewis looked both beautiful and sexy in her gold dress. Her whoop of delight and beaming smile when accepting her award for top female matched the radiance displayed so prominently on advertising posters since her win in Sydney.

Paul Dickenson cast an eye across the ballroom. The five junior girls were returning to their seats. He cleared his throat with a light cough. He had one other *special* award to announce. To present the award he invited up onto the stage Jean Pickering, and her son Sean. Both were warmly applauded as the spotlight followed them to the front of the ballroom. Jean was the widow of the great television sports commentator, Ron Pickering, who died in 1991. Their son, Sean, was an international hammer thrower and a successful businessman. Dickenson waited for the noise to subside. He began by speaking about *a man who had been around for a long time. Twenty-three years on the international athletic scene. In spite of that longevity had seldom received the recognition that he deserved. Until, in the twilight of his career, he walked into the limelight.*

Smiling eyes suddenly turned towards our table. I started to sink into my chair. The realisation that it was *me* to whom Dickenson was referring was almost too much. I barely heard the remainder of the tribute, until, 'and in appreciation of his services to British athletics, the Ron Pickering Memorial Award goes to...' I felt the heat of the spotlight descend upon me. I did not clearly hear my name amid the back slapping and cheering. Dumbstruck, I remained rooted to my chair.

I heard Katie's voice. 'Go on Chris. It's you!' I looked at her. She had tears in her eyes. In a state of shock, I rose to my feet, and from the back of the ballroom I began to weave my way past the tables, shaking outstretched hands as I went. Two months had passed since my legs had felt so weak.
