ESSEX FAREWELLTO A CENTENARIAN and CENTURION

A funeral service for Centurion 576 George Mark Eastwood, who died aged 100, was held at Green Acres Cemetery in North Weald, not far from the World War II airfield, close to Epping Underground Station and easily accessed by frequent buses or minicabs. The Centurions were prominent, as a large sign "Centurion 576" was affixed to his coffin, an "Order of Service" had a full-page picture of George race walking. In tributes shown on a large screen during a period of reflection during the a very well attended service, were pictures of George the athlete - also George a downhill skier and an opening batsman. Entry music was "Fanfare for The Common Man", music during a reflection period was a Spanish classical piece (George owned a Spanish villa), with exit music "The Trap" (known as BBC TV's "London Marathon theme"). George completed 5 London Marathons. A chosen reading

was "If" by Rudyard Kipling which commences, "If you can keep your head when all about you are losing theirs" etc, etc. Afterwards saw a truly upmarket gathering at "The Green Man" - a traditional old Essex public house with oak beams in "Toot Hill", a remote village near Ongar. A magnificent spread with complimentary drinks, plus a photo display of George's life (many athletics pictures) with his medals on display.

Alas few race walkers - when one would have expected more for both a centenarian and Centurion. We had 2, both Centurions: one being Jack Rossiter (Enfield) - who as Centurion No 577 has the number next to late George's, which certainly impressed the family. Jack resides at Waltham Cross, not far from Enfield stalwart Martin Oliver. Jack used his knowledge of buses to reach this service, and presented the family with his written account of George's impressive race walking contribution. Details of George's funeral were widely circulated and drew a number of responses - which unfortunately advised that a chosen date (Tuesday 4 March/1pm) was inconvenient for most and also a couple were unwell to travel. However, you'll be pleased to note athletics was well represented by a good turnout of office holders and members from Woodford Green with Essex Ladies AC (as now called) including 97 year old Jack Hayward (V95 category) who now takes over from dear departed George as that Club's esteemed oldest living member.

BILL'S MILESTONE

Regular Essex Walker contributor **Bill Sutherland** is to celebrate his 80th birthday on Sunday 6 April. Bill was an established name from the mid-60s onwards soon coming to the attention of International Selectors, and included among International appearances were major events such as European Championships and Commonwealth Games plus National Championship titles. Bill's name was synonymous with the famous Highgate Harriers, who in such earlier times could put out 'A', 'B', 'C' and 'D' teams in 4-to-score Open races, County, Area and National Championships. Bill's name was often first on Middlesex County team sheets. He was a loyal member of the Metropolitan Police and British Police Representative teams and turned out for both with regularity. Those were times when top race walkers were active most weeks and for the Met he'd be there for Inter Club races, as indeed he was for Highgate events. He was always prominent on much missed "Highgate 1 Hour races which saw packed tracks (at both Parliament Hill Fields and Copthall Stadium) over 4 graded races - to wit 'A'to-'D' Sections with Bill a leading light as an 'A' competitor. He was the first Scottish athlete to gain a medal in the 1970 Edinburgh Commonwealth Games - bronze in the 20 Miles Walk clocking 2:37.24. He didn't get quite the kudos merited; as when entering Meadowbank Stadium for a lap of the track towards the finish line, legendary BBC athletics commentator David Coleman didn't know who he was - apart from him being a tall Policeman. Bill had some luck as "smart money" was on an Australian 1-2-3 but for some unexplained reason they only selected 2, who came 1st and 2nd, leaving out 1968 Olympian Frank Clark, who a couple of years earlier had a brief spell with Ilford AC.

Bill failed to appear in Scotland's official Commonwealth Games team photograph - as when sent his blazer it didn't fit so needed alteration. It wasn't returned in time for the photograph and an official prevented him taking a place before the lens as he wasn't attired like the others. Come 1972 Bill's name was "on the radar" for Munich Olympic selection. Paul Nihill and Phil Embleton, both sadly no longer with us, were 20k "certs" so a 3rd spot was up for grabs. Things didn't go Bill's way in the Selection Committee room - though when names were announced the one-and-only Arthur Gold told Bill he should have been selected. Despite Arthur being "all powerful" he couldn't overturn a Race Walking Association recommendation. Upset as Bill was - and still is - he put profound disappointment aside to campaign hard, with others, against a decision to cease race walking as an Olympic event. Bill spent much time visiting places here-and-there, often using his own leave to do so in a bid to drum up support for retention of our discipline on Olympic programmes.

Bill had a spell away from Highgate Harriers to join Ilford AC and was so active he was elected as a most popular President in 1994/95. When at the top table for Ilford's Annual Dinner & Dance at Chigwell's Police Sports & Social Club his chosen after-dinner guest speaker was another "one-and-only" person - the late Mel Batty. It was a memorable occasion. Bill's a proud BEM (British Empire

Medal) recipient - when at Buckingham Palace to receive it from a now late Queen Elizabeth II he acquired a top hat and put it under his chair in the presentation hall. A Palace *flunkey* tapped a shoulder to inform him guests are required to place such items in cloakrooms!

He was an Organising Committee member of a 1989 "Arthur Eddlestone BEM Memorial 100 Miles Walk at Hendon Police Training School (100 x 1 mile around its perimeter in atrocious weather) which was a major successful promotion. Bill was determined to complete a 100 Miles' Walk, for membership of an exclusive Centurions' organisation, open only athletes completing this distance in under 24 hours. He did so at the 1991 Ewhurst 100 Miles in Surrey around a 10 x 10 miles course, clocking 23:49.36 to become member 890. As the task got tougher during cold of the night Bill's wife and greatest supporter for decades, Kath, cheered up spirits by singing "Maybe it's because I'm a Londoner". When interviewed by a reporter from his local newspaper (Islington Gazette) about this feat he was asked where he'd put up for the night? Bill told her 100 miles start one day/finish the next, with competitors competing through the night - not sleeping! The journalist was most impressed. Bill contributed to The Centurions by serving as their Honorary Secretary from 1994-to-1999.

Bill has returned to Highgate Harriers and nowadays is prominent as an ideas and suggestions man, following in footsteps of great Highgate Harrier Charlie Megnin RIP, a 1946 European Championship 50K Walk bronze medallist. He main love in recent times is parkruns where he's compiled a long list of both appearances as a participant and as an official/helper, having received service awards for so doing. We wish Bill well on his 80th birthday.

June was presented with a bouquet of flowers and a Marks and Spencers gift voucher. What a star!



MEETING OF MINDS

British race walking numbers and successes have nose-dived over recent decades, with a much reduced number of participants, shortage of officials, few newcomers, a high average age, a nonexistent activity in many areas, many discontinued events and few triumphs on our International stage. Over decades one thing has remained constant - the number of meetings, be they held by the Race Walking Association, its Areas, Counties and at Clubs. An interesting whole page article in "The Times" on 21 February, penned by brilliant journalist Harry Wallop, looked at the state of British meetings. It opened by suggesting the first item on any agenda should be "Is this meeting a waste of time?". A key decision must be to cut the duration of meetings and insist of them being more focussed. Anyone who waffles or goes off topic is "ELMOed" (Enough, let's Move On). One study suggested the average business person spends 213 hours a year in meetings. He writes, "At least we got through the agenda" is sometimes the most one can hope for at 4pm on a rainy Wednesday, after 90 minutes stuck in a room without even the benefit of some Hobnobs. Recently, a Havering Councillor stated many meeting attenders only come for the coffee and biscuits. An expert described an agenda as reductive, "It's a list which doesn't tell us what we're trying to do, what role we're playing, and doesn't help people to contribute". An agenda is often just a way to avoid conflict: "Let's just get through this list". When Ford took over Volvo cars in 1999 (sold on in 2010) its first act was to impound their newly acquired Company's meeting room keys - only to be used if a Head Manager thought them vital. Harry Wallop concluded his article on meetings with, "We just need to make those gatherings less frequent and more useful". Race Walking needs meetings and your Southern Area have streamlined their Committee (as reported in last month's edition) to achieve noticeable improvements. It needs more of you supporting what's put on for you by those on these Committees are keen to promote, and for too many "stayaways" to return to our start lines. A final comment which applies to some Committees, but by no means all, "A committee is something that takes minutes and wastes hours". Surely not in our branch of athletics?

SAD DEATH OF A GREAT FRIEND OF RACE WALKING

Don Turner (Epson & Ewell Harriers) has passed on aged 88. Not a race walker, but one who called our times on so many occasions, especially when competing south of the Thames. A long distance runner of note, he was London-to-Brighton runner-up in '59 and 3rd in '61 and '63. In '62 he was 3rd in a gruelling South African "Comrades Marathon" clocking 6 hours 7 minutes. His marathon best of 2:32.42 came in 1968, and on Surrey's Walton cinder track in 1960 he set a world record for 6 hours when covering 52 miles 1,100 yards. October 1980 at Walton rings a bell, as that month on the same track Hew Neilson set a number of race walking World Records on route to clocking 133 miles 21 yards at 24

hours. A long-serving timekeeper he was Chief Timekeeper for an inaugural 1981 London Marathon and a pioneer of photo finish equipment at Crystal Palace. Don officiated as Chief Timekeeper at highly popular "Night of the 10,000 metres PB's" meetings on Parliament Hill Fields track. He regularly contributed to Athletics Weekly and Athletics Today. Don Turner RIP.

- Very sad news about Don Turner and a nice <u>obituary</u> in AW. We remember him very fondly as an official at all kinds of events, including racewalks, and a regular official at the Sri Chinmoy 24h, reflecting his deep interest in ultra-distance events. Don was an early member and a lifetime supporter of the RRC, the Road Runners Club, founded by Centurion Ernest Neville to promote the famous London to Brighton run. The run became almost as famous as the much older London to Brighton walk, whose origins dated back to the late C19th, the era of the birth of our oldest walking club, Surrey Walking Club in 1899. Back in the 1980s I had the pleasure of both walking and running the open Brighton races before the sad demise of both events. Don was for many years the Treasurer of National Union of Track Statisticians and well-known in that capacity, and as a highly respected athlete and official, to our own Colin Young and others. A news report for the 500th Great Notley parkrun (22 March 2025) featured a contribution by a guest writer (parkrun tourist) where she described her experience of the milestone event. As readers may be aware, Tony Perkins is a keen supporter of his local parkrun – a fact not lost upon the guest writer, as illustrated by the extract below:

"I have started to include the "volunteeriest volunteer" in my run reports as an alternative to "runniest runner". A high number of runs is impressive; however, it would not be possible without our volunteers who ensure week in week out, in all conditions, that we can enjoy our parkruns.

There were many contenders, with many volunteers having done 200/300+ volunteers. There was one clear stand out winner in the form of Great Notley regular Anthony Perkins, with a staggering 678 volunteer credits (with 1179 total times volunteered). You don't see that many run credits that high, let alone volunteering credits. In addition to Great Notley, Anthony has also volunteered at Markshall Estate, Mersea Island and Great Notley Juniors. Anthony regularly volunteers at parkrun on Saturdays and then again on Sundays with Junior parkruns – what a star!



Anthony began his volunteer journey at Great Notley parkrun (event number 10) as a marshal on the 30th August 2013. He has fulfilled 6 distinct volunteering roles; Marshal, Pre-event Setup, Event Day Course Check, Post-event Close Down, Token Sorting and "other".

Thank you, Anthony and all the other volunteers, for ensuring we can enjoy our parkruns."


"ALL ABOARD"

There's applause for Tom as he's taken information about our chosen athletics discipline to new audiences on the high seas. Many years ago, both Ron Wallwork and Eric Hall booked on a cruise ship bound for the Norwegian Fjords - and "bumped into each other" at a Day 1 induction meeting. They arranged a race around the ship's deck which they called "Arctic Circle 3,000 metres walk". By coincidence they accidentally bumped into each other years' later when on the same New Zealand North Island beach. Nearer home, a 3rd coincidental meeting came on a 24 miles' walk in Norfolk when Ron was building up mileage for his 1992 successful Centurions attempt. At a quiet village near Grimes Graves, 8 miles from Thetford, as Ron crossed a hump-backed bridge by chance Eric Hall was making progress on a towpath beneath it. Just 30 seconds' difference by either athlete and that meeting wouldn't have occurred. Hon Ed knows Grimes Graves well as beside it is a large military training area, where Hon Ed did RAF leadership and initiative training - and where "Dad's Army" external scenes were filmed.
