Another Golden Double for Arthur

The club and country's outstanding veteran walker Arthur Thomson (M70) literally walked away with another golden double at the European Veteran's Championships staged at Nyiregyhaza, Hungary.

On the 16th of July he won the 5km track event in 28.40 from Russia's M.Sinagulov whose time was 29.13 and two days later was almost five minutes clear of his rivals when triumphing in the 20km road championship. His time for the 20km was 2.05.00 and the runner-up once again was Sinagulov in 2.09.49.

After a long absence, Arthur returned to race walking in 2005 in the M65 category, scored his first European double indoors at Eskilstuna and since then, indoors and out added another six doubles taking his title tally to fourteen. He has also to his credit two World doubles and **two world trebles!**

Also winning gold at the European Veteran's Championships in Hungary was Steyning's Ian Richards (M60) who won the 5km in a time of 24.24. Dave Kates (M60) competed in the 20km finishing eleventh in 2.09.34

Maureen and Fiona collect Marathon Medals

In the women's events which were over five and ten kilometres. *Leaguers* Maureen Noel (W45) placed fifth in 30.44 and sixteenth in 62.23, whilst Fiona Bishop (W50) was fifteenth in 34.03 and fourteenth in 10km with 68.02. **However, it was in the marathon** where the ladies really made their mark; Maureen took a wonderful individual bronze in 4.14.24 and Fiona was second scorer in 4.39.05 in the gold medal winning team. Runner Heather Stuart (W50) was the third scorer.

Spotlight on Mike Hinton



Mike, because of his mum's evacuation from the London Blitz was born in Bridgewater Somerset on 13th April 1941. He was introduced to Athletics and the sprints in particular at Senior School in Rochford, Essex in 1954 and represented the school in the District Championships at 100 and 220 yards.

It was as a sprinter that he joined Southend AC after leaving school in 1956 aged fifteen. However, a year later Johnny Atkinson persuaded him to join his youth race walking squad which included Peter Marlow who would later become an Olympian. In his debut race over one mile he finished last and remembers Peter lapping him. Following a couple of years with moderate success as a team member posting 44.54 for five miles and well over six and a half miles in the hour, he admits to being impatient with his rate of progress and returned to sprinting, but it wasn't long before he turned to amateur boxing, for which he developed a great passion

He boxed at bantam weight and after winning his first bout at Eltham Baths in 1961, Mike then made the finals of the county championships. His coach Joe Webb went on to become Canada's national coach. The sustaining of a broken nose in 1962 coupled with the difficulty in matching him, because of his light weight resulted in a loss of interest and he left the sport.

For five years or so sport didn't figure very largely in Mike's life. During this period he married Iris and they set up home in north London, where in 1967 he joined the twenty or thirty walkers of Highgate Harriers. Bill Sutherland was the club's top man at the time and so strong was the section that it took almost three years to break into Highgate's scoring four.

It was now 1971 and whilst working at Blackfriars he decided to train daily at lunch time. This was done on the Embankment and brought immediate benefit and he enjoyed his best results in 1971 and 1972. The most satisfying performances were with Highgate and the most pleasing, was winning the 'B' section at the Highgate 1 Hour meeting in 1972, covering 12,088 metres within the hour.

Four years later he moved back to Essex and joined the fledgling Newham AC under the influence of Tommy Kent and amongst its members were Dave Sharpe and Mike Scammell (still competing). He stayed with them until 1977 until being disillusioned by the controversial rule change; he decided to retire from the sport. Mike left race walking with the following P,Bs all done in Highgate colours:

A spell of road running which included a 3.06 clocking in the inaugural London Marathon in 1981 was pursued until 2001. During this time he ran first with his daughter and later his son as well as helping out with other youngsters at Havering AC. Mike's running P.Bs were a 35.37 10km, 61.32 10 miles, an 81.00 half marathon and 3.05 for the full marathon.

On taking early retirement in 2001, Mike started walking again to keep fit and after a number of weeks steady strolling worked on a bit of speed over the park. With no injury problems this prompted him to have another serious go at race walking after a gap of twenty-five years. An enjoyable race for Ilford AC in an LPR 9km event got him hooked once again and over the past nine years he has been a great supporter of the *League*. As a M60 his times improved until 2006, his most satisfying race being in 2005 when age 64 he clocked 45-41 for 5 miles at Battersea Park. Since his return from an enforced absence through injury in 2007 his times have declined with each passing year.

He was shocked upon returning to race walking in 2001 to see just how much the event had shrunk in his time away from it and the way it has continued to do so. With fields made up of veterans and youngsters in short supply, he fears for its future and fervently hopes that the situation can be turned around.

Now due to another change in circumstances he leaves Race Walking once again to set up home in Bournemouth, Dorset, where, if there was an active Race Walking scene he would be continuing to heel and toe. He describes his sporting career as 'nothing special' and using boxing parlance he has been 'a useful journeyman'. The cornerstone of Race walking's success has been the legions of useful journeymen who over the years made up the broad base from which so many champions emerged.

I'm sure that all *Leaguer's* wish Mike and Iris all the best and hope that from time to time, there may be the occasional opportunity when he can join us again.

Results Round-Up

Fransisco Reis was the winner of the **Southern Vets 2km league race** at Hemel Hempstead on 12th July. His time was 9.09 and filling the minor placings were Peter Ryan 9.49 and Steve Allen 9.56. Helen Middleton was the first club walker home was in fourth in 11.00, Sean Pender was sixth in 11.28, Norma Grimsey ninth 12.56, Ken Livermore seventeenth in 16.39 and Alan Flavell eighteenth in 16.40. Barbara Edlin walked but did not appear in results, not sure where she got to. Other club members involved were Margaret Livermore and Paul Ray, who along with Dave Ainsworth acted as officials.

Leaguer Steve Allen (Barnet) took part in the **Swiss 50km championship** on 3rd July, held through the streets of Yverdon-les-Bains in extreme heat (32c) and humidity. Only nine of the seventeen starters finished, Steve being the ninth in a time of 6.09 something. He told me that he really enjoyed the challenge and happy to get a 50km event in the bag.

Helen Middleton finished third in the **VAC 5 miles** at Battersea Park on 14th July. Her time was 46.38 compared to winner Steve Allen's 45.47 and second placer Steve Uttley's (who started late) 46.34. Ilford's Steve Allen was fourth in 48.29. Sean Pender fifth in 48.58 and Ron Powell eleventh in 53.42 were the club's only other competitors in what was a smaller field than usual numbering thirteen.

Club member Malcolm Brown had a go at the **Bury 15 miles** walk on **18th July**. It turned out to be more like seventeen, much of it along tracks, paths and fields which made for tough going, but none the less enjoyable. Mal's time was 3.56.

Tom Bosworth clocked 20.57 when winning the **SEAA 5km** track championship at Hendon on 24th July. Diane Bradley with 27.03 set a championship best performance to win the ladies race in which Helen Middleton with a time of 28.49 finished second.

Twelve walkers; six women and six men, turned out in the **EVAC one mile** at Kings Lynn on 28th July. Cath Duhig was the easy winner in 9.43 and Sue Smith third in 11.07.

Steve Uttley in 15.15, Steve Allen (*Barnet*) 15.43 and Helen Middleton 16.43 led home the nine walkers who took part in the second of the summer's **Woodford Tuesday** meetings on 3rd August. The highlight of the event was the performance of under thirteen Heather Butcher (Cambridge H) who finished fourth in 17.34, just four seconds ahead of Sean Pender. Newcomer Mikk Bradley (Watford) bettered 20 minutes on her debut.
